Redrow wins on appeal

The main news on planning issues is that Solihull Council rejected the Parkridge plan for 78 apartments at 1266-1288 Warwick Road in September. Parkridge may well appeal or submit a new plan, or possibly revert to the earlier plan for 42 apartments, which has already been approved.

The Inspector has sided with Redrow and allowed it to proceed with its plan to build 24 apartments at 1290-1300 Warwick Road. He took the view that there is a need for smaller homes (which we accept) and he also thinks that this does not set a precedent for elsewhere.

The application for the conversion of buildings at Hall Farm (Lidgates) to make 12 new dwellings has been referred to the Secretary of State for approval

Many residents are relieved that the application by Demrastore for developments at the old Thacker's nursery has been withdrawn, but we all wait to see what the eventual outcome will be.

This is my last Newsletter report, since I will shortly be leaving the area for family reasons. I should like to thank the members of the Planning Sub-Committee who have supported me over the last few years. These include Dr. Bower, Peter Ellis and Peter Morton. The main brunt of the work has been undertaken by Norman Stanley and Phil Vince and we are all very grateful to them. Since Dr Bower and I are leaving, we are pleased to welcome two new members, Geoffrey Vaughan a retired building surveyor and Peter Ewin, a retired solicitor. I am pleased to say that Peter Ewin has kindly agreed to take over as Chairman and he can be contacted on:

Financial Report for 2002-3

The Knowle Society Balance Sheet and Accounts for the year to 30th September 2003 were presented at the Annual General Meeting on 24th November 2003.

Total Income for the year amounted to £4632, the main source being subscriptions of £2537. Unpaid subscriptions for the year 2002/2003 amounted to approximately £400 as at the accounting year end. Some of these outstanding subscriptions have since been paid.

There were no exceptional items in Expenditure, although it was noted that the Civic Trust subscription had risen sharply. Membership of the Trust however enables the Society to insure through them at a very competitive rate.

The deficit of £750 was transferred to the Accumulated Fund, which now stands at £3229, with a further £5000 in the Reserve Fund.

The Eva Wootton Fund now stands at £3879, with £100 having been donated to Knowle Parish Church towards the cost of bringing the Guild Register to the Village in February as part of the Church's 600 years celebration.

Mr Andrew Chadwick A. C. A. audited the accounts and was re-elected as Auditor.

It was also reported at the Annual General Meeting that the Executive Committee recommended a rise in the subscription rate. The last increase was in 1990. A proposal to increase to £3.00 for single membership, £5.00 for family membership and £10 for Vice Presidents was passed by a majority of those members present. The increase will come into effect from 1st October 2004. After the AGM it was realised that the Constitution only allows for Vice Presidents to be charged three times the rate of single membership. The V P's subscription from 1st October 2004 will therefore be £9.

Pathfinder: St John's Close

Since the last Newsletter, the Pathfinder group has held a second Open Day in October, in the Village Hall. The team presented the findings from the first Open Day and posed a set of recommendations. Again the community's views were sought on the material presented but this time the responses were gathered less formally than by a questionnaire.

Some might consider that the community response was poor but actually there were only slightly fewer people than the first time. The team felt that the quality of interest was very high and was encouraged that the proposals were generally 'scratching where it itched'! In addition some interested new members were recruited and we hope to be able to build on the contacts made then.

In the presentations made at the second Open Day, proposals were made about one-way systems around the green and linking the car parks by Tesco and the Village Hall. Radical rearrangement of these car parks was also proposed. Improvements to the appearance of the path from Lodge Road, past the Scout Hut to the green were suggested, as were other pedestrian routes in the central area. Partial parking restrictions were

proposed for the section of St John's Close between the green and Lodge Road. Changes to the junction with Lodge Road and Longdon Road were proposed to slow the traffic in Lodge Road, ease the exit from St John's Close and enable easier pedestrian crossing of Lodge Road.

In the light of the encouraging responses and the absence of significant disagreement, the team feels justified in moving to the next stage, which is to prioritise and clarify the objectives and present them to Solihull Council.

Anybody wishing to raise questions or contribute ideas is invited to contact us. We are continuing our contacts with individual residents as they are requested and these are very welcome.

A GREEN REVOLUTION?

At the Planning Sub-Committee meeting of the Council on 15th October, a group of residents made several objections to the provision of skateboarding facilities within Jobs Close Park, also known as Knowle Park. It also came to the Society's attention that the proposed sighting of the facility had been changed from that shown on previous consultation plans. On this basis the Society objected. It is to be made clear that the Society is in favour of additional provisions being made for the benefit of children within the park, subject to them being considered appropriate to the positioning, and not becoming an eyesore.

The objections have been acknowledged by the Council, and at the time of writing, (late November); it appears that some benefit is to come from the concerns expressed in the form of a new group being formed, called the Friends of Knowle Park. It is hoped that the Society can work closely with this new group to ensure that the beauty of our landscaped area can be protected, and maybe enhanced, so that ALL the residents and visitors can be proud of our heritage, not only for the present, but for the future as well.

SPEED KILLS!

The provision by the Council of a mobile speed monitor around the village in Browns Lane, Longdon Road, Tilehouse Green Lane, and Lady Byron Lane, is to be applauded. It is a stated fact that the majority of offenders exceeding the 30 mph speed limit are the local inhabitants of the area concerned. It is to be hoped that the residents of Knowle heed the warnings issued by the equipment, before the Police are in attendance and issue the necessary fines.

West Midlands Police have issued their winter warning in connection with vehicle theft, both from the vehicle and of the vehicle itself. The Special Constabulary have been targeted to ensure that areas of vulnerability are made less attractive, i.e. hotel and public house car parks, unlit private and council car parks, and the active policing of hotspots. Residents are reminded to be diligent when first starting their vehicles in the morning. Do not leave the vehicle "warming up" on the drive without an occupant. In addition be aware of key theft from the premises by moving the keys away from sight, and ensure that the car is garaged where possible. Vehicle crime in our area is the highest crime figure. Please be careful.

IS IT A BIRD, OR IS IT A PLANE?

Your sub-committee had the opportunity to attend the offices of the Birmingham Airport Environmental Monitoring unit. Before attending we were of the opinion that a substantial increase in over flying, and

the subsequent increase in noise, was occurring above Knowle. The equipment shown to us was impressive, and to receive a demonstration was even more staggering. In total we spent nearly two hours witnessing the effects of the equipment and asking questions, with the result that we are now convinced that apart from the odd occasion the sky above the village is not being used more frequently by aircraft. It was also explained that the direction of the wind in the atmosphere can also have a significant effect on the noise element. An excellent visit which has been recommended to the Meetings and Social committee for it be included in their future programme.

WHAT NEXT?

Liaison with the group responsible for the Pathfinder project, in order to look at the results and prepare recommendations to be included in a report to the Council. If anyone would be interested in this work, please make contact.

Monitoring the traffic situation will receive special attention, and maybe it is about time for the Lodge Road/Warwick Road/Hampton Road junction to be investigated again. In this connection I look forward to receiving your comments and any proposals you may have to rectify the increasing problems that occur at this junction. I would point out that if few accidents have occurred around this junction in the last three years then the Council will not consider the need to take any further action. I appreciate that some people are of the opinion that because of the way that the junction is, then it is to be considered an advantage; and is in itself a traffic calming measure. These views will equally be appreciated.

The removal of the public conveniences in the park have pointed out more strongly that there is a need for a more central modern toilet in the village. This matter will also be explored with the Council, and if you have any observations then please forward them.

Around the corner you have the early part of spring to look forward to, and just think, it will soon be April, when you read my article again.

Freeze or Burn?

It was -3°C . with a Siberian wind when this report was written last year! Today, after last week's cold and stormy spell, it continues very mild at 10°C . with alternating heavy rain showers and bright sunshine. Today is typical of the turbulent weather patterns of climate change. Swans and geese are appearing far to the north of their normal range, the famous Glencoe Ski Centre is closing down for this winter, and Severn Trent is going to take vast quantities of water from the River Severn to mix with our local supplies. So much of our present rainfall rushes directly from storm-water drains in roads and built-over flood plains and is lost out to sea, instead of filling the underground aquifers so needed in times of drought.

Black Poplars - Inexplicably, none of last year's cuttings have survived, whether in tree-wardens' gardens, the Council's old tree nursery, or in water. We shall try again, with more advice from the Biological Records Centre.

Trees - overhanging ash trees in Hillmorton Road have at last been pruned back following complaints by the residents. If anyone is concerned that future development or even driveway work could endanger the root system of an old-established tree, the Council may consider making a Tree Preservation Order. We will pass on any of your concerns.

Warwick Road - All the London Plane trees in the Warwick Road between Knowle and the M42 are being felled for safety reasons. Solihull Council wants to replant with non-native Red Oaks, but there was an overwhelming vote at the Society's A.G.M. in favour of Small-leaved Lime, one of Britain's oldest native



trees which, unlike the Common Lime, does not drip honeydew.

Nature Reserve - Our Nature Conservation Committee celebrated its 30th Anniversary with a very jolly party for present and past members and helpers at the Red Lion. Our guest speaker was David Lowe, Solihull Council Ecologist, who told us that the boundaries of the proposed Local Nature Reserve had now been extended outwards from Purnells Brook into the Park, and that a partial dredging of the pond would safeguard the resident moorhen family and the mallards.

Brueton Nature Centre (Solihull) - is very popular with school parties and children's activities, and it will soon promote environmental education for adults. The cafe has a new franchise and is now open every day of the week.

Jobs Close Park - From a nature conservation point of view, this lovely park is quite unique. Its wonderfully open aspect and its gentle downward slope over the still just visible outlines of ancient ridge and furrow ploughing, to the equally tree-lined Purnells Brook as it meanders through its little valley—all this makes our Park a very special place indeed, whether wandering with the family, walking the dog, playing games on the way to the village or just to the Play Area. And there is no traffic to spew out its polluting fumes and noise! A big Thank-you, here, not only to the Rangers, but also to the dads and mums—and to the dog walkers—who regularly pick up other people's litter and are meticulous themselves, in their own dog care.

The Concept Plan fills our Park with imaginary trees and shrubs that would hide its open aspect—as well as its glorious sunsets! And, having been drawn on to a blank map, it does not identify the existing treescape of named tree species as shown on the Tree Officer's computerised map. Would not the Plan have been more useful to the public as an overlay on this computer map? There are in fact many anomalies in the Concept proposals which we hope to discuss with

the Council in the New Year, such as trees in front of the Jobs Close hedge and shrubbery over the traditional toboggan run!

Britain-in-Bloom for Knowle? - Stella attended a seminar in Oswestry for all Heart of England villages, to discuss the possibility of each hosting its own *In Bloom* event. Despite much enthusiasm, the huge amount of organisation and commitment needed from the whole community, let alone sponsorship, makes for a very brave decision to 'go it alone', especially as Knowle benefited enormously from the Council's wonderful floral displays all down the High Street and around the village. But we will pass on the information to other Knowle organisations!
